New School

The new school is coming together nicely although I do believe the wet weather has slowed a few things down.

In January the School Council went over to the Morgan Sindall offices. The council met the Project and Site Managers. They explained that the building project was behind by a week due to the weather. The children asked questions that had been posted in the post box from the entire school. The Managers explained that the kitchen would have all new equipment and that there would be a separate dining hall.

Mr Cooke explained that they had chosen to have a separate music room rather than an ICT room as this would be more beneficial to the school. IT equipment is more portable than musical equipment.

Mr Cooke also explained about the colours for the new school, KS1 blue and KS2 green with communal areas being purple.

The new school will also have a new stage block and lighting system.

School books

A polite reminder of the importance of looking after school books – a number of which are being returned to school badly damaged.

We also have a number of books missing. Please can you check at home and return any books belonging to the school. Lost and damaged books carry a cost of £5 per book.

School Attendance and Punctuality

Regular attendance at school is crucial in raising standards of education and in ensuring every child can meet their full potential. Missing out on lessons leaves children vulnerable to falling behind. Children with poor attendance tend to achieve less in both primary and secondary school.

The Government expects:

- Schools and local authorities to:
 - reduce absence including persistent absence;
 - ensure every pupil has access to full-time education to which they are entitled; and
 - act early to address patterns of absence.
- Parents to perform their legal duty by ensuring their children of compulsory school age who
 are registered at school attend early; and
- All pupils to be punctual to their lessons and attend school regularly

We have a number of children who are late on a regular basis. All children should be in their classroom ready for the register to be taken at 8.55am. Children who arrive after 8.55am are marked as late and the minutes are recorded on their attendance records.

Parking

Parking is still a big problem at the start and end of the school day. If you are travelling to school in a car please be respectful of the residents by parking appropriately. Inappropriate parking puts the children's safety at risk and causes an inconvenience to the residence when their driveways are blocked.

Pupil Premium and UIFSM

You may be familiar with the words 'Pupil Premium' and 'Universal Free School Meals'. These two funding grants are different and play a very important part of your child's education.

Universal Free School Meals:

 All children in Reception to Year 2 are entitled to a free meal under this scheme regardless of your income. Even if you are not entitled to any state benefits, you are entitled to a UFSM (Universal Free School Meal)

Pupil Premium:

- In the 2015 to 2016 financial year, schools received the following funding for each child registered as eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years because they are in receipt of **Income Support or Child's Tax Credit**:
- £1,320 for pupils in reception year to year 6
- £935 for pupils in year 7 to year 11
- Further information on how they spend their Pupil Premium can be found on their school blog

In order for schools to receive the Pupil Premium Funding for a child, the family must complete a Benefits Claim Form (attached). We believe, because of the Universal Free School Meal, that many parents are not completing this form as their child is already receiving a free school meal. As a school, we are losing out on thousands of pounds worth of funding for your child's education.

What do you need to do?

They need all parents from Nursery to Year 6 to complete a form – even if you are not sure!

Forms are available online or from the school office. If you require help in completing the form or require any further information please contact a member of the school admin team who will be more than happy to help you.
